

BATON ROUGE - By next year, law enforcement officers on their way to a crime scene in East Baton Rouge Parish could be much better prepared for whatever awaits them.

Baton Rouge Police Chief Murphy Paul says an officer typically has only two to three minutes from the time he is dispatched until he reaches the call. Too often, the chief says, the officer arrives with only the most basic information.

However, if Paul, Sheriff Sid Gautreaux, and District Attorney Hillar Moore have their way, that two to three minutes will be used to brief the officers on a great deal of information on what they are about to face.

This will be accomplished by establishment of a Real Time Crime Center, which will bring together all available information, including the location, its history of crime problems, information on individuals at the scene, real time video, license plate reader infor-

mation, and much more. Sgt. Neal Noel said the Baton Rouge City Police and Sheriff's office hope to open the facility next year. Other law enforcement agencies will be invited to participate, he said. The result could be officers better prepared to face difficult situations at the crime scene.

Three Incumbents from South Baton Rouge

Seek Reelection to EBR School Board Nov. 6

BATON ROUGE - Three incumbent members of the East Baton Rouge Parish School Board representing parts of South Baton Rouge found themselves with opponents when qualifying closed on July 20. Each one faces a lone opponent in the Nov. 6 primary.

Newly-elected school board member Mike Gaudet, a Republican, faces opposition, as does former school board president Evelyn Ware-Jackson, a Democrat, and veteran Republican member Jill Dyasson of Southeast Baton Rouge. Charter school corporations are reportedly opposing some incum-bents and plan to spend \$60,000 to \$100,000 each. It marks the first time that charter school forces have entered the political world here.



Congressman Garret Graves Visits Lily Bayou Structure **Diversion Canal Closer to Reality**




The Comite River will connect to this canal, which will divert water to the Mississippi.

CENTRAL — Congressman Garret Graves, fresh off an historic victory in Washington, where he helped gain funding for the remainder of the work on the Comite Diversion Canal, visited the canal last week.

The project, which has lan-quished for 30 years until Graves' breakthrough, seemed to come alive as the second-term Congressman described the scene at the Lily

man described the scene at the Lily Bayou Control Structure. When the Comite River is at flood stage 53 feet above sea level, it will automatically top the weir at the Lily Bayou Control Structure and flow west into the Mississippi. Graves eyes glowed as he de-scribed the water rushing over the weir and diverting millions of gal

weir and diverting millions of gal-lons away from Central and pointssouth and east.

It was a celebratory visit – Graves' first since his historic victory. He used the chance to give two Central officials their first look at the Comite Diversion Canal. Central Mayor Pro-Tem Kim Fralick and Kim Powers, candidate for Central Council at-Large, spent an hour at the site, which is somewhat reminiscent of the Panama Canal.

Fralick and Powers both expressed thanks to Graves for the work he has done to finally put the funding in place for project. Fralick said, "Getting to visit Lily

Bayou with Congressman Graves was a surreal experience. I am truly appreciative for all the work he has put in to make it a reality." Powers said, "Many people

played an important role, but without Garret's single-minded determination, this would not have happened!'



Graves' Determination Pays Off

The Flood, Devastation, The President's Visit, Graves' Chairmanship, And Never Giving Up!

SOUTH OF ZACHARY — At the Lily Bayou Control Structure Wednesday, Congressman Garret Graves was doing what he does best speaking passionately about a cause he believes in, in this case the Comite Diversion Canal.


The scene was surreal. The day was blistering hot. The massive Lily Bayou structure, reminisent of the Panama Canal, sat there as it has for the past 10 years – patiently waiting to be used to relieve flooding in Central and down the Comite and Amite rivers.

Built at a cost of \$32 million, it is the only part of the \$400 million Comite Diversion Canal, which has been built, although the project was authorized by the Louisiana Legislature 30 years ago.

Graves spoke to those in the del-



during lengthy meetings with President Trump in the White House,



Trump was an instant ally, having come to Central immediately after the flood of August 2016. He

Woody Jenkins knew first hand how important this project is. Pence too was onboard. He and Graves had spent six hours together flying back and forth for a visit to Louisiana, which gave the Congressman all the time he needed to make his case.

But Office of Management and Budget director Mulvaney was a tougher nut to crack. The President might be for the project and so might the Vice President, but the reality was that it still had to fit into the budget in competition with the needs and demands of 50 governors, 100 senators, and 435 representatives, all of whom have their own priorities.

It took Graves six meetings

egation with the same passion he did with Mulvaney. It didn't hurt that the two had served together in the House. But it wasn't until Graves was named Chairman of the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment — which placed him squarely in charge of the Army Corps of Engineers — that things began to change.

Mulvaney asked a friend's advice on a matter involving the Corps of Engineers. The friend said, "You should call Garret Graves! He can help you with the Corps!" Mul-vaney said, "I can't! He'll just talk about the Comite project again!"

Not long afterwards, it was over! Mulvaney and the Trump administration were totally on board, and they committed all the money needed to complete the \$400 million project. "They just got tired of hearing from me!" Graves laughed.

Of course, getting approval of such a large sum of money is never

a one-man show. So many played important roles! Senators Bill Cas-sidy and John Kennedy, both from the Baton Rouge area, kept up the pressure. Local officials like Central Mayor Jr. Shelton went to Washington to testify. Legislators such as Sen. Bodi White and Rep. Valarie Hodges constantly held hearings and raised the attention of the public, the media, and elected officials.

But two of the most pivotal have to be President Trump who had seen the need with his own eyes and Congressman Graves, who burned with passion over the issue.

Being at Lily Bayou was surreal, Central Mayor Pro-Tem Kim Fralick said, because you could feel that one day, the waters of the Comite will be surging through that structure saving homes and businesses in Central. Fralick said, "It will bring peace of mind to the vast majority of our citizens!"



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

Legal Experts Evaluate Trump's Nominee for U.S. Supreme Court



PANEL ON JUDGE KAVANAUGH — Three experts — Prof. Michelle Ghetti, attorney Catherine Jenkins Newsome, and Sen. Beth Mizell - expressed their views on Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh at a meeting of the Ronald Reagan Newsmaker Luncheon.

BATON ROUGE - Two legal experts and the leader of the Louisiana Legislative Women Caucus gave their evaluation of Judge Brett Kavanaugh, President's Trump nomi-nee for the U.S. Supreme Court, to the Reagan Newsmaker Luncheon.

Speaking were Michelle Ghetti, professor of Constitutional Law at the Southern Law School; Catherine Jenkins Newsome, president of the Federalist Society of Baton Rouge, and Sen. Beth Mizell (R-Franklinton), the chairwoman of the caucus of all women in the Louisiana House and Senate.

All three agreed Kavanaugh is well qualified for the job.

Prof. Ghetti who worked for a year as a fellow at the Supreme Court said Kavanaugh would likely be in the mold of the Justice Scalia than the Justice Anthony Kennedy, whom he would replace.

Newsome is a leader of the Federalist Society, which proposed Kavanaugh to Trump.



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

A Message to All Istrouma High Graduates The Challenge of Istrouma High Today vs. When We Were There

Editor's Note: Istrouma High School, once the largest high school in Louisiana and one of the most outstanding, fell on hard times a few years ago. It was declared a failing school and was taken over by the State of Louisiana. Unfortunately, the State too failed and decided to close the school permently four years ago. It was permanently four years ago. It was destined for demolition. However, a band of determined Indian alumni refused to let that decision stand. Three years ago, a new superintendent, Warren Drake, and the East Baton Rouge Parish School Board, succeeded in getting Istrouma High back from the State. They invested near \$30 million and turned it into virtually a new school. They handpicked a new prin-cipal, staff, and faculty and planned a new program that was designed to draw students from North Baton Rouge and pull the once tight-knit community back together. The school reopened in August 2017 and had a banner year ending in May 2018 with banner year, ending in May 2018 with 452 students. Now Istrouma is beginning its second year with an amazing 852 students — 89 percent growth in one year! North Baton Rouge is coming home to Istrouma High!

Now that Istrouma High School has reopened and is up and running for its second year, I want to address my fellow Istrouma grad-uates from the 1950's and 1960's about where we go from here. I love Istrouma High School — our community, our traditions, our history of achievement, our faculty and staff, and my fellow Istrouma graduates. No one loves Istrouma any more than I do! So I hope you will take what I am about to say in the spirit that it is intended.

I arrived at Istrouma High School as a wide-eyed 10th grader in August 1962. My family was poor because my dad was disabled from wounds and injuries he suffered during combat in World War II. Despite his sacrifice, the U.S. government didn't even see fit to give him a pension. He did get to go to the VA hospital but they only made his problems worse. We struggled financially every day because of Dad's disability.

Most of my fellow students also came from humble backgrounds, although the vast majority had a father who was working and had a steady income. In fact, almost all of us had a mama and a daddy with us at home. When I was in the 6th grade at Fairfields Elementary, our 6th grade teacher took a poll of the 30 students in our class. He asked how many of you have a parent who has been divorced? Only one student had a parent who was di-vorced. The other 29 had a mom and dad at home. Divorce was rare, and we had the advantage of the care and guidance of two loving parents. Let me stop right there a moment. Of course, you realize that you and I did not create that situation. We didn't create that home or those parents who cared about us. Our parents created that situation. We were GIVEN a loving home and two loving parents. Our par-

ents had to work at it, but it was not something you and I earned. We could have been born in China or India in a place ravaged by poverty or war. But God really blessed us by allowing us to be born into a family in North Baton Rouge! That was a great advantage that we enjoyed.

The community of North Baton Rouge — which was amazing was not something you and I cre-ated either. It was GIVEN to us by the people who came before us – people who worked very hard and gave of themselves.

When we arrived at Istrouma High School, we arrived at a school steeped in tradition. It was a tradition of SUCCESS! Yes, there were countless championships, honors, and awards. But we didn't create Istrouma High School. It was there waiting for us. It was EASY to BELIEVE that we too could be successful, because at Istrouma success was right before our eyes! To achieve success, we simply had do what we were told. We KNEW that success was possible! How could we not? The evidence was all around us. We saw other kids just like us who had achieved success in every way. We were surrounded in our daily lives by countless role models. Our parents, our neighbors, our pastors, our teachers, local business owners, and even political leaders were outstanding. This was the World War II generation! They had sacrificed everything so that this nation could remain free! Who would not be inspired to follow these heroes? Young boys had real MEN to look up to. Young girls had virtuous LADIES to duplicate and follow.

NO ONE – absolutely NO ONE – told us we were losers and couldn't be successful. If they had, we wouldn't have believed it anyway. We knew that if we did the work and paid the price, good things would happen for us.

So, with two loving parents, a wonderful community, a tradition of success all around us, and countless role models, we plowed on too, and most of us did what we were told. Today, the vast majority of us can look back with pride on our lives and with gratitude for the role Istrouma High School played. We were truly blessed in so many ways!

and often lack the necessities of life. They lack transportation to get places. Too often there is no one to take them to school activities and events. They have attended schools that are very different from ours. Some of them have been labeled "failing schools" taught by "failing teachers" — however false that often is!

Many have never been told they are champions or leaders or bound for success. On the contrary, they have often been told they are losers headed to prison or an early death. And the evidence that is correct is all around them. In the past two years, we have had more than 50 murders in 70805 alone.

I say all this not to excuse bad behavior by anyone or to suggest that this country of ours, this state, and this community are not filled with opportunity, because they are! I believe there is more opportunity today than ever!

This article is directed at my fellow Istrouma High graduates. If I have heard it said once, I

have heard it a thousand times, "Well, I hope the school is a success, but it will never be like it was when we were there!"

Yes, indeed that is true. It was for us — a wonderful moment in time that can never be recreated. But never forget: We were the recipients of a wonderful gift — Is-trouma High School — that we did not create. We simply walked in the doors, did the work, and reaped the rewards. The opportunity was given to us, and we took advantage of it.

The truth is, Istrouma High School is far, far more important TODAY than it was when we were there. In the 1950's and 1960's, East Baton Rouge Parish was a growing, dynamic place with a bright future. But today, this par-ish is in deep trouble. We are on the verge of becoming another De-troit or Chicago. And so many of our worst problems are centered in North Baton Rouge, where crime is so great and there is a lot of misery and hopelessness.

Nothing is as important as our faith or our family. However, beyond faith and family, Istrouma High School is the thing that offers the most hope to turn around the lives of the people living in North Baton Rouge. There is no "community" in North Baton Rouge today. It is just a random collection of people who live in the area. Until last year, there was no high school between Scotlandville and Baton Rouge High. There was no Istrouma High School to hold North Baton Rouge together. But now the new Istrouma High School is the focal point for once again making North Baton Rouge into a community. What does Istrouma High School offer today? A plan of action to turn around the lives of its students, and I can tell you that it's working! Because of this school, students will be prepared for col-There is a shortage of positive lege or to get a good job. The school offers strong discipline with zero tolerance. It focuses on character, and that will make all the dif-

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

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

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
