BATON ROUGE — Two incumbent members of the Louisiana House of Representatives are running for State Senate District No. 6, which includes Central,

in the Oct. 14 primary — Rep. Barry Ivey, who has represented Central in the House since 2013, and Rep. Rick Edmonds, who has represented the St. the House since 2015.

The two are vying to succeed Sen. Bodi White, who is term limited.

The most important race on the Oct. 14 election ballot will be governor. Republican Attorney General Jeff Landry and Transportation Secretary Shawn Wilson have been endorsed by the Republicans and Democrats respectively. According to most polls, Landry and Wilson are likely to run first and sec-





BATON ROUGE — Late in 2022, the East Beau Clark — have already been reelected,

because they were unopposed.
"The sheriff is critical to maintaining law and order. If the sheriff is viewed as tough on crime, citizens have more confidence living here and criminals tend to go elsewhere. Sheriff Gautreaux is seen as a conservative Republican but fair across the board. We felt it was most important that he be reelected."

"The Clerk of Court, Doug Welborn, administers the filing of legal documents, the conduct of elections, and many other important functions. It is critical that he be reelected."

Jenkins said the No. 1 goal of the party remains reelecting Gautreaux and Welborn Oct. 14. "We'll have a Republican governor and legislature, because the state is conservative. Elections are much closer in this parish, which is why we are focused on these two.'

Instead, he has decided to support Attorney General Jeff Landry, the candidate for governor endorsed by the Republican Party of Louisiana and the Republican Party of East Baton Rouge Parish.

Nelson is an attorney who has served one term in the House, gaining a reputation as a moderate Republican largely because of his stand on legalizing marijuana and some social issues. He previously served in the diplomatic field.

Rep. Nelson has reportedly applied to be the new president of the Louisiana Association of Business and Industry.

Stating that the petition did not have a plan is a direct insult to your ability to make a knowledgeable decision. Over 17,000 voters fully understand the services to be offered and the method of paying for those proposed services.

If Mayor Broome and Council member LaMont Cole failed to understand, then it only gives credence to the need to incorporate the City of St. George.

However, we are optimistic that the Louisiana Supreme Court will correct this error.

The upcoming elections are important to the success of our future as a community.





All of the information shown is required by La.R.S.33:1 to appear on the petition, including certain basic information such as the population, value of property, the list of services and the plan to deliver them. The law contemplates only a brief description so as to fit on the petition.



BACK SIDE OF ST. GEORGE PETITION as proved by the Secretary of State and the Attorney General. La.R.S. 33:1 requires that the boundaries of the municipality be listed, as well as a map of the proposed city. These two items, even in very small print, take one side of the petition, which was approved by the Secretary of State and the Attorney General.

State Law Requires the 'Plan' for Rendering Services to Fit on the Petition

1st Circuit Clearly Misinterpreted What Kind of 'Plan' St. George Had to Submit

A Detailed Business Plan Would Not Fit on The Petition and Thus Was Not Required

BATON ROUGE — On July 14, 2023, Judge Mitch Theriot of Louisiana's 1st Circuit Court struck down the incorporation of the City of St. George. He did so on the basis that the incorporators of the City of St. George failed to provide a 'plan' for rendering municipal services as required by La. R.S. 33:1.

I had the pleasure of serving with Mitch Theriot when he was a member of the Louisiana House of Representatives. He is obviously a fine judge who writes well thought out, even scholarly, legal opinions.

In his opinion on St. George, the judge adroitly steps through Louisiana's law on incorporation with

all its nuances. One good thing about the opinion is he ruled that Mayor-President Sharon Weston Broome was not a proper party to the suit. In order to file suit, the law is very clear that she would have to be a resident of the proposed new city, a property owner in the proposed new city, the municipality itself, or a member of the governing authority of Baton Rouge (the Metro Council). She met none of those criteria. The amazing thing is that it took the courts four years to recognize the obvious and throw the

honorable mayor out of court! Unfortunately, Judge Theriot fell into error when he ruled that the incorporators did not provide an adequate plan for the new city.

The district court previously ruled that the incorporators of St. George "minimally satisfies the requirements of the statutes.'

Judge Theriot reversed that holding of the district court and ruled instead that "Although the petition listed the services that would be provided, the petition did not provide the necessary information to place citizens of the area to be incorporated on notice of a plan for provision of those services."

State law provides in La.R.S. 33:1 that the Secretary of State will provide the form for the petition to be used for gathering signatures, and that any form that does not conform to that form will be invalid.

Furthermore, the statute clearly provides the information which must appear on each petition form. The amount of information required to appear on each petition is very great. See opposite page. The statute provides as follows:

La.R.S. 33:1: "The secretary

of state shall provide a form approved by the attorney general to be used for the petition for an incorporation election. Such form shall be in conformity with the provisions of this Section and R.S. 18:3. All incorporation petitions shall be on an approved form or on a form which contains the same information as required on the approved form and any petition not on such form shall be invalid. The incorporation petition shall include the following information:

(1) A legal description of the area proposed for incorporation, a map of the area proposed for incorporation, and the statement that all lands included in the area constitute a contiguous area. The description shall also include a list of every parish in which the proposed area of incorporation is wholly or partially situated.

(2) A statement of the number of inhabitants residing in the unincorporated area of the proposed incorporation. Such statement shall be based on the latest federal decennial census or another current population report or count which is

(3) A statement of **the assessed** value of the immovable property located in the unincorporated area.

(4) A listing of the public services the municipal corporation proposes to render to the area and a plan for the provision of these services.

(5) A statement of the corporate name desired for the new municipality.

(6) The names of two persons, who shall be designated as chair-

the petition for incorporation who shall serve as agents for the petitioners in all legal matters, including the receipt of notices. Notice will be sufficient if served on the chairperson or vice chairperson."

Therefore, the entire list of services and the plan to provide those services must appear on the petition itself!

The form of the petition approved by the Secretary of State and the Attorney General is only one sheet front and back. Just the description of the boundaries and map of a proposed municipality takes up one side. And of course there must be room for printed names, addresses, and signatures of petitioners.

The statute is **vague** about what is to be included in "the plan for the provision of these services" but one thing is certain: The plan cannot be detailed, because it must

fit on the petition!

If the Court of Appeal was expecting a detailed business plan for the new city, that is obviously not what the law contemplates, because, as the court notes, the law must not be interpreted to create absurd results. The law contemplates voters being handed a petition — not a 20-page booklet.

In fact, the incorporators of the City of St. George did an excellent job of doing precisely what the law requires regarding the list of public services to be provided and a plan to provide those services.

Here's the list of public services which the City of St. George proposed to provide and the plan for providing those services. The **bold** faced items are the public services to be provided and the *italicized* language is the plan for providing those services. This appeared on every petition signed by voters.

"1. Public Safety services

through the continuation of services provided by St. George Fire Protection District, East Side Fire District, and the East Baton Rouge Parish Sheriff's Office.

"2. Sanitation and garbage **collection** through the continuation of services provided by the consolidated garbage service district. "3. **Sewerage** by continuation

4. Emergency Medical Services though continuation of service by the EBR Parish Department of EMS.

"5. **911 Services** through continuation of services provided by the East Baton Rouge Parish 911

'6. The City of St. George may provide the following services through contractor(s) or municipal

"6a. Regulation of property use by adoption of planning and zoning ordinance.

6.b. Building Inspections. "6.c. Traffic signs and signals."6.d. Maintenance and improve-

ment of municipal public streets and roads. "6.e. Maintenance of right of

way.

"6.f. Maintenance and improve-

ments of drainage system. 6.h. Animal control.

"All services will be provided subject to **the availability of funds** derived from taxes, license fees, permits and other revenue which become available to the municipality and are authorized by state

For the incorporators to be expected to provide more than that and still fit on a petition is unreasonable and not what the law contemplates.

The plaintiffs in this case made much of the fact that providing services depends on the availability of funds, but isn't that always the case everywhere and for everything?

The Court of Appeal can take iudicial notice of the U.S. Census that provides that **the household** income in St. George is over \$90,000 a year, the highest of any municipality in Louisiana. The notion that the new city will not have enough money to provide for essential services is far-fetched indeed.

The 1st Circuit should reverse its decision or the Supreme Court should overturn it. The plan for St. George is more than adequate!

The petition very well describes the services to be provided and the plan for providing them in the space available!

Widespread Opposition to Sale to Out-of-State For-Profit

Hearing on Sale of Blue Cross Oct. 5-6

Policy Holders Can Speak on Proposal At Hearing Set by Comm. Jim Donelon

BATON ROUGE — The Board of Blue Cross of Louisiana is moving forward with its plans to sell the non-profit mutual insurance company to a for-profit mega-insurance company called Elevance (formerly Anthem). Blue Cross has 1.9 million policy holders in Louisiana, while Elevance has 47 million policy holders nationwide cy holders nationwide.

Louisiana Insurance Commissioner Jim Donelon will hold a public hearing on the sale at 10 a.m. on Oct. 5 and 6 at 1702 N. Third St. He has the power to approve or disapprove the sale. If he approves it, it will still be subject to a vote by members, who would have to approve the sale by a 2/3rds vote.

The sale has been controversial

and drawn opposition from policy holders, agents, legislators, and even the Louisiana State Medical Society.

The major points of controversy

are as follows:

• Theft from Policy Holders. The owners of the company are the 90,000 members. The sale price is \$2.5 billion. Yet, less than 9 percent of that amount would be distributed to the members. The rest of the

sale price plus about \$900 million in reserves would be turned over to a recently-formed Delaware nonprofit called Accelerate Louisiana Initiative to distribute as it desires.

Some Blue Cross policy holders have likened this use of funds as nothing less than theft. Attorney Henry Kinney said the proposal is "dishonorable" and "a usurpation of the rights of policy holders."

Kinney said, "These assets belong to the members. The Board of Blue Cross wants to turn these funds

over to a self-appointed, self-perpetuating board of a new foundation —

funds that belong to the members!

• Destruction of a Louisiana
Company. Blue Cross is a Louisiana company with Louisiana owners and 3,500 Louisiana citizens as employees. Critics say the new owners will make their decisions. owners will make their decisions out of state and can be expected to move offices out of state and

"trim" the number of employees.

• Service Problems. Policy holders and providers of Elevance in other states report delays in payment and approval of procedures. Many physicians report widespread dissatisfaction with Elevance.

• If It Ain't Broke, Don't Fix

It. There is a belief among policy holders that Blue Cross is working well for them with a non-profit model based in Louisiana. So why

The **Central City News** filed a request with the Commissioner asking him to reform the voting proce-

dures Blue Cross is using to secure approval of the proposed sale.

The newspaper said Blue Cross sent out mail ballots with very one-sided information about the sale, and also attempted to get members. and also attempted to get member approval by telephone and by voting online. The newspaper said, "These decisions involve billions of dollars and the health care of nearly 2 million Louisianians. If there is a vote, it should be fair. We ask that if you allow an election to be held that you issue an order that would include the following features:"

"Appoint a group of three opponents of the sale to draft a one sheet, front and back, to be included in the materials sent the policy hold-ers fairly describing the arguments against the sale. That the group of opponents be approved to receive proxies from members and be allowed to submit those at the policy

holders meeting."

"That voting be similar to mailin voting in Louisiana, where a ballot must be placed within an inner and outer envelope, which would have to be signed by the member with his mother's maiden name, and witnessed by another person. That voting by any other means except by mail or in-person be prohibited.

"We ask that you issue an order directing that the procedures out-

directing that the procedures outlined above be followed."

is running in a distant third place in some polls, followed by former LABI president Steve Waguespack, state Treasurer John Shroder, and Sen. Sharon Hewitt, all of whom are Republicans.

In a recent development, another Republican candidate, Rep. Richard Nelson, announced that he is dropping out of the race and endorsing Jeff Landry as the best choice.

Landry has been dominating the polls and fundraising.

In the final days of the campaign, attacks on the top candidates can be expected.

In some ways, the governor's race has never really heated up as many expected. Landry received the endorsement of the Republican Party of Louisiana late last year and the endorsement of the Republican Party of East Baton Rouge Parish in March. He led from the earliest polls to the present.

Some big business leaders helped majority in the Louisiana House hold and possibly increase that mafund Waguespack's entry into the and Senate. They are expected to jority by a couple of seats. race, but despite spending heavily, Waguespack campaign has not gotten the traction some of his supporters expected.

The Attorney General was endorsed early by former President Donald Trump, who remains very popular in the state. Many voters identify Landry with Trump and see him as having a similar philosophy.

On the Democratic side, Shawn Wilson has cleared the field of serious Democratic opponents. However, many Democratic leaders see the race as unwinnable, and a large Democratic turnout is not expected.

In the Baton Rouge area, the hot legislative races involve Republicans while few Democratic incumbents have opposition. At present, there appears to be far more interest in the election on the Republican side than on the Democratic side.

Republicans have a two-thirds

Parish.

Both Ivey and Edmonds have conservative voting records.

Although the district is spread over three parishes, most of the voting population is found in the St. George area and in Central.

Ivey is better known in Central, and Edmonds is better known in St. George. St. George has significantly more of the district than Central.

Edmonds got on early start on the race and appears to have made inroads with Central voters. He is endorsed by the Republican Party of East Baton Rouge Parish. Outgoing Sen. Bodi White has also endorsed Edmonds.

Both candidates are family men. One interesting thing they have in common is that fact that each have a family member running for their House seat. Barry Ivey's twin brother Brandon is running to replace him from House District 65.

Rick Edmonds' son Richie is running to replace him from House District 66.

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

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



Morris spoke on the truancy rate in Louisiana, which is at 35 percent, and discussed plans to bring this down. He said 90 percent of murderers and murder victims have an education level at the 9th grade or below.





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

Sale Would Take \$3.4 Billion from Members Of Blue Cross and Give It to New Foundation

Blue Cross Proposes to Take Over Members' Ownership of Company, Give Its Proceeds to **Delaware Foundation**

BATON ROUGE — Some con games are pretty sophisticated. The taking of \$3.4 billion from the owners of Blue Cross/Blue Shield is not one of them. On the contrary, this slight of hand is quite simple, and it's out in the open for anyone to see - if they bother to pay attention to what is happening.

Blue Cross is a non-profit mutual insurance company. It serves 1.9 million policy holders in Louisiana. On its website, Blue Cross says, "Blue Cross is Louisiana-owned and -operated. It is a non-profit, fully taxed, mutual company owned by its policy holders — not share-holders."

The Board of Blue Cross has proposed selling this Louisiana company, which employs nearly 3,500 Louisiana citizens, to Elevance, a for-profit, mega-insurance company with 47 million policy holders across the nation.

The sales price is \$2.5 billion.

What is most unusual about the proposed sale is that the \$2.5 billion sales price would not go to the 1.9 million policy holders of Blue Cross or to the 92,000 members

with voting rights.
Rather, the \$2.5 billion sales price would go to a new non-profit foundation, which was recently organized in the State of Delaware.

Earlier in the year, the Board members of Blue Cross, each of whom receive \$105,000 a year for sitting on the part-time board, gave its members the option to become initial members of the Board of the new foundation, which incorporated in Delaware under the name The Accelerate Louisiana Initiative.

The articles of incorporation of Accelerate have not been available online, nor have the officers or board members been announced.

However, in testimony before the Joint Legislative Committee on Insurance, Tim Barfield, who was listed as Chairman of the Blue Cross Board of Directors, said that he is Acting Chairman of the new Accelerate foundation.


As of Sept. 21, 2023, Mr. Barfield is still listed on the Blue Cross website as a member of the Blue Cross Board of Directors.

Veteran Attorney Predicts Sale Will Be Rejected after Hearing

BATON ROUGE — Attorney Henry "Tut" Kinney, who has practiced law more than 50 years, predicts the proposed sale of Blue Cross will be rejected. "Honestly, the legal barriers are just too great for this sale to go through," he said.

Kinney said, "Under Louisiana law, specifically La.R.S. 22:232.1, Blue Cross has to show the benefits and risks of this proposed reorganization and sale. The statute requires they show the immediate and longterm benefits to policy holders. They can't do that because there aren't any. Similarly, the law provides that when the Commissioner of Insurance holds a hearing on a

matter such as this he has to make a determination that the sale is in the immediate and long-term interests of policy holders.'


The company is profitable. The president of the company just made the statement there is no need to sell the company now. Their reserves are \$1.8 billion, more than twice what is needed.'

"As far as the foundation is concerned, how can giving it the proceeds of the sale be in the interests of policy holders? The whole thing simply doesn't make sense. Even if members voted for this, it won't hold up because you can't take away people's property interests."



Under the terms of the Agreement and Plan of Acquisition, the purchaser will pay for "the extinguishment of the membership interests of the Company held by the

Eligible Members."

In other words, Blue Cross is selling the membership interests of the members of Blue Cross.

An examination of the Plan of Acquisition shows the following:

- The sales price of \$2.5 billion will be paid by Elevance's holding company to The Accelerate Louisiana İnitiative foundation.
- In addition, out of Blue Cross' excess reserves, approximately \$900 million will be paid to The Accelerate Louisiana Initiative foundation, and approximately \$300 million will be paid to eligible members of the Blue Cross, or about \$3,000 each.

It has been estimated that the prorata share of the purchase price if allocated to each member would be in the range of \$35,000 to \$40,000.

The remaining reserves of Blue Cross would be transferred to El-

It must be understood that the Agreement and Plan of Acquisition do not spell out exact amounts to be paid or transferred. The amounts here are based on the best information which is publicly available.

The sale of Blue Cross to Elevance and the payments to Allevate Louisiana would result in the following:

- Blue Cross of Louisiana as we know it would no longer be a Louisiana business based in Louisiana. Elevance, a for-profit company, would be able to move its headquarters and offices anywhere. The nearly 3,500 Blue Cross of Louisiana employees would have no guarantees as to their future.
- The valuable asset which Blue Cross members currently have an ownership interest in a multi-billion Louisiana company worth an estimated \$35,000 to \$40,000 per member — would be lost.
- A new foundation with \$3.4 billion in assets would emerge. controlled by four members of the Blue Cross Board of Directors and whoever they choose to put on the Board. The assets would amount to 3,400 millions, making it one of the 25 largest foundations in the U.S.
- The new foundation currently has no assets, no history of raising or managing funds, or clear publicly available statement of its goals and purposes.
- Statements by the acting chairman, Mr. Barfield, indicate the foundation would focus on addressing health "inequality" in the state.

Attorney General Files Suit to Block **Clemency Efforts** For Murderers


BATON ROUGE — Louisiana Attorney General Jeff Landry has filed a lawsuit to block the Governor from short-circuiting the rules and procedures of the Board of Pardons. In his court filings, the Attorney General noted that eligibility and notice rules were ignored, timeliness requirements were unlawfully waived, necessary steps in the process were skipped, and proceedings outside of the public eye were conducted when clemency hearings for death row inmates were scheduled.

"The Board of Pardons should not sacrifice the rule of law, the rights of victims, and the public's participation simply to achieve the Governor's political objective," said Attorney General Landry. "The laws on our books must be enforced and proper procedure must be followed."

"The court must ensure our clemency process advances in a legal and transparent way," added Attorney General Landry. "The victims of Willie Tart, Larry Roy, and other murderers deserve truth, transparency, and justice; I am fighting to deliver that for them."
